What is a Charter School?

A charter school is a public school that operates as a school of choice. Charter schools commit to obtaining specific educational objectives in return for a charter to operate a school. Charter schools are exempt from significant state or local regulations related to operation and management, but otherwise adhere to regulations of public schools – for example, charter schools cannot charge tuition or be affiliated with a religious institution.

In other words, charter schools are publicly **accountable** – they rely on families choosing to enroll their children, and they must have a written performance contract with an authorized public chartering agency. Charter schools are also **autonomous** – they have more flexibility in the operations and management of the school than traditional public schools.


Number of charter schools as of 2018–2019




Number of LEAs/public school districts with authorizing capacity
